Wendy Cadge

Wendy Cadge is the 10th president of Bryn Mawr College and a nationally renowned expert in contemporary American spirituality and religion.

Cadge previously served as the dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at Brandeis University. She received her bachelor's degree with high honors and majors in Sociology and Anthropology, and Religion, from Swarthmore College, and her master's and Ph.D. from Princeton University.

A sociologist by training, President Cadge is known for her work on religion in public institutions, religious diversity, and pluralism, and as a highly respected educator, scholar, and administrator.

A public intellectual, she has written more than one hundred scholarly and general interest articles, many in collaboration with students and colleagues across disciplines, and four books on issues related to spiritual care across settings, religion in hospitals, and Buddhism in the United States. Cadge launched the Chaplaincy Innovation Lab in 2018 to advance the work of chaplains in providing innovative spiritual care and she frequently works with the media and community partners.

Her research and teaching have been supported by numerous foundations and trusts, including the E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation, Fetzer Institute, Henry Luce Foundation, John Templeton Foundation, Lovell Foundation, Radcliffe Institute, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Scholar in Health Policy Research Program, Ruderman Family Foundation, Russell Berrie Foundation, Templeton Religion Trust, and The Charles H. Revson Foundation.

Cadge is a member of the American Sociological Association (ASA), the American Academy of Religion (AAR), and the Society for the Scientific Study of Religion. She is a founder and past chair of the Innovations in Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care Program Unit of the AAR. She is a previous chair of the Religion Section and the Committee on Professional Ethics of the ASA. Her published books include *Chaplaincy and Seafarers: Faith at Work*, *Spiritual Care: The Everyday Work of Chaplains*, *Paging God: Religion in the Halls of Medicine*, and *Heartwood: The First Generation of Theravada Buddhism in America*. She is co-editor of *Introduction to Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care* and *Religion on the Edge: De-Centering and Re-centering the Sociology of Religion*.

At Brandeis, her achievements included centering the graduate student experience by rebuilding and expanding student professional development, collaborating to extend degree programs into new modalities, advancing the graduate school's anti-racism plan, and reconnecting current students and alumni to celebrate the school's 70th anniversary. She received the Thomas A. King Faculty Award from the Gender & Sexuality Center, the Dean of Arts and Sciences Mentoring Award for Outstanding Teaching of Students in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, and the Michael Walzer '56 Award for Excellence in Teaching. She also served as the Senior Associate Dean for Strategic Initiatives, led the Division of Social Sciences, and chaired the Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Program. She served on the faculty at Bowdoin College from 2003 to 2006.

Speaker Bios

Cynthia Archer '75 joined the Bryn Mawr College Board of Trustees in 2001 and was elected chair in 2021. She recently concluded six years of service, including as chair, on the board of the Common Application. She also serves on the board of Independence Mission Schools. During her corporate career, she held executive leadership and senior operating positions in transportation, retail, and energy companies. She earned her MBA at Harvard University.

Sally Bachofer '97 is a Bryn Mawr College trustee and president of the College's Alumnae/i Association. She also received her Ed.M. from the Harvard Graduate School of Education. Bachofer's work in K-12 education has prioritized establishing and expanding access to strong education options for students and their families. She has created pathways for student, school, and community success in public education systems, and through education focused nonprofits and mission-driven philanthropy. Bachofer is currently a policy fellow at the Hoover Institution.

Sava Berhané is the VP of Customer Success at CareMessage, the largest patient engagement platform in the US. Her previous roles include SVP at AlayaCare, an enterprise health tech organization and COO of HouseWorks, the largest independent homecare agency in the US. As a lecturer at Brandeis, Berhané taught intro to business and leadership and has a B.A. from Mount Holyoke College and a J.D. from Yale Law School.

Christine Boyland has worked in higher education for more than 40 years as both faculty and staff. She started at Bryn Mawr in 2006 as the director of the Language Learning Center and now is the senior educational technology specialist in Library and Information Technology Services, where she supports teaching learning and research using technology, promotes the Digital Competencies Program, and teaches Digital Storytelling.

Alexie Coleman '27 is a Bryn Mawr sociology major. She is the co-president of the affinity club, Sisterhood* and is involved in the Self-Government Association as co-elections head. This past May, she participated in the first student-led Model Constitutional Convention at Arizona State University's Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law.

Renata Del Vecchio '25 is a Bryn Mawr senior and Posse Boston scholar studying computer science, math, and creative writing. A love of all things nerdy brings their work in fiction to strange places, but poetry has become a stage for them to look to reality, amplified with a fantastical edge. They are also treasurer to the Fencing and Life Drawing clubs and excited to appear in *John Proctor is the Villain* in November.



Erica Graham '04 is an associate professor and chair of mathematics at Bryn Mawr College. Her research interests are in the field of applied mathematics with a focus on mathematical modeling in endocrinology and other biological applications. In particular, her work focuses on physiological mechanisms of dysfunction in metabolic and ovulatory systems.

Wendy E. Raymond, now in her sixth year as the 16th president of Haverford College, is a molecular biologist with degrees from Cornell and Harvard. An award-winning scholar and teacher, she is a seasoned leader who has held multiple leadership roles in higher education and national service. She is leading the implementation of Better Learning, Broader Impact – Haverford 2030, a strategic plan to position Haverford for its third century through reinvestment in Haverford's values-based, liberal arts core.

Adalia Xiony Rodriguez '24 was born and raised in Boston, Massachusetts. She graduated in 2024 with a Bachelor of Arts in geology and is a part of the Posse Boston 20 cohort. Rodriguez currently is a crew member at the National Parks of Boston Climate Conservation Corps to address urban climate change through science, adaptation, mitigation, and communication.

Barbara D. Savage is an historian from the University of Pennsylvania and the Geraldine R. Segal Professor Emerita of American Social Thought in the Department of Africana Studies, where she also served from 2013 to 2017 as inaugural chair. In 2018-19, she was the Vyvyan Harmsworth Visiting Professor of American History at the University of Oxford. She is the author of three award-winning books and co-edited two others.

Jeffrey Shoulson serves as dean of Arts and Sciences at Brandeis University, with a faculty appointment in the Department of English. A scholar of early modern literature and culture, Shoulson's research focuses on intellectual, cultural, and literary encounters between Jews and Christians in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. He holds an A. B. in English Literature from Princeton University, an M. Phil. in Renaissance Studies from the University of Cambridge, and a Ph.D. in English Literature from Yale University.

Valerie Smith, a distinguished scholar of African American literature, is the 15th president of Swarthmore College, where her priorities have included creating a more diverse and inclusive community of students, faculty and staff, supporting curricular innovation, renewing facilities, and strengthening partnerships between the College and the region. She is the author of three books on African American literature and culture and the editor or co-editor of five others.

Sarah E. Spielman Ph.D. '27 is a fourth-year physics Ph.D. student advised by Dr. Michael Noel. Originally from Shaker Heights, Ohio, she received her B.S. in physics from Denison University. As an National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellow, she explores energy transport in quantum systems using ultracold, highly excited atoms. She is a co-chair of the Bryn Mawr Graduate Student Association and can be frequently found walking her dog Theo around campus.

Jamie Taylor, the Mary E. Garrett Alumnae Professor of Literatures in English, specializes in the literature and culture of medieval England, with teaching and research interests in medieval law, documentary culture, and cross-cultural literary and cultural exchanges (particularly Anglo-Iberian). Her first book, *Fictions of Evidence: Witnessing, Literature, and Community in Late Medieval England* (Ohio State, 2013), examines legal and theological forms of testimony. She is currently researching the ways medieval English writers deployed “Spain” as a geopolitical heuristic.

Lisa Traynor is a Bryn Mawr professor of Mathematics and the Class of 1897 Professor of Science. She currently holds the role of Faculty Chair. Lisa joined the Bryn Mawr faculty more than 30 years ago.

Frederick F. Wherry is the vice-dean for Diversity and Inclusion in the Office of the Dean of Faculty and the Townsend Martin Class of 1917 Professor of Sociology at Princeton University. He is finishing his 10th book, *What Debtors Deserve* (under contract with Crown Publishing). He received his B.A. at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and his Ph.D. at Princeton. He previously taught at Yale, Columbia, and Michigan.

Nanar Yoseloff '97 completed ten years as a trustee of Bryn Mawr College and is now a Special Representative. She serves as a trustee of the Central Park Conservancy, the American Museum of Natural History, and the Dwight-Englewood School. She previously served on the national board of Girls Inc. Yoseloff graduated from Bryn Mawr in 1997 and Cornell Law School in 2003. She lives in New York City with her husband and three children.

Academic Regalia

From the cap, gown, and hood, it is possible to distinguish the institution from which the wearer has graduated, the field of learning in which his or her degree was earned, and the level of degree: bachelor's, master's, or doctor's. The distinguishing feature of the black mortarboard cap, standard at most colleges and universities in the United States, is the color of the tassel — black for the holder of bachelor's or master's degrees and gold for doctor's degrees and the governing officers of educational institutions. Bryn Mawr College allows bachelor's candidates to wear a tassel of their class color.

The gown is normally black, although several institutions have authorized optional doctoral gowns, which embody the institution's colors. The level of the degree is indicated by the gown's cut. The bachelor's gown, which is relatively simple, may be recognized by its long, pointed sleeves. The master's gown is somewhat fuller, and its sleeves, which reach nearly to the wearer's knees, are square at the ends. The gown for the doctor's degree is cut rather full; velvet panels reach down the front and around the neck, and the sleeves are bell shaped and decorated with three horizontal velvet bars.

The hood is the most distinctive feature of academic attire in the United States. Originally used as a cowl, a shoulder cape, and a container in which to collect alms, it is now worn at the back, suspended from the shoulders. The length of the hood and the width of its velvet border indicate the level of the degree held. The inner lining of the hood is the official color or colors of the institution conferring the degree.

The hood's border colors indicate the fields in which the degree was earned: arts, letters, and humanities — white; business administration — brown; economics — copper; education — light blue; engineering — orange; fine arts — brown; law — purple; medicine — green; music — pink; philosophy — dark blue; public service — peach; science — golden yellow; and theology — scarlet.

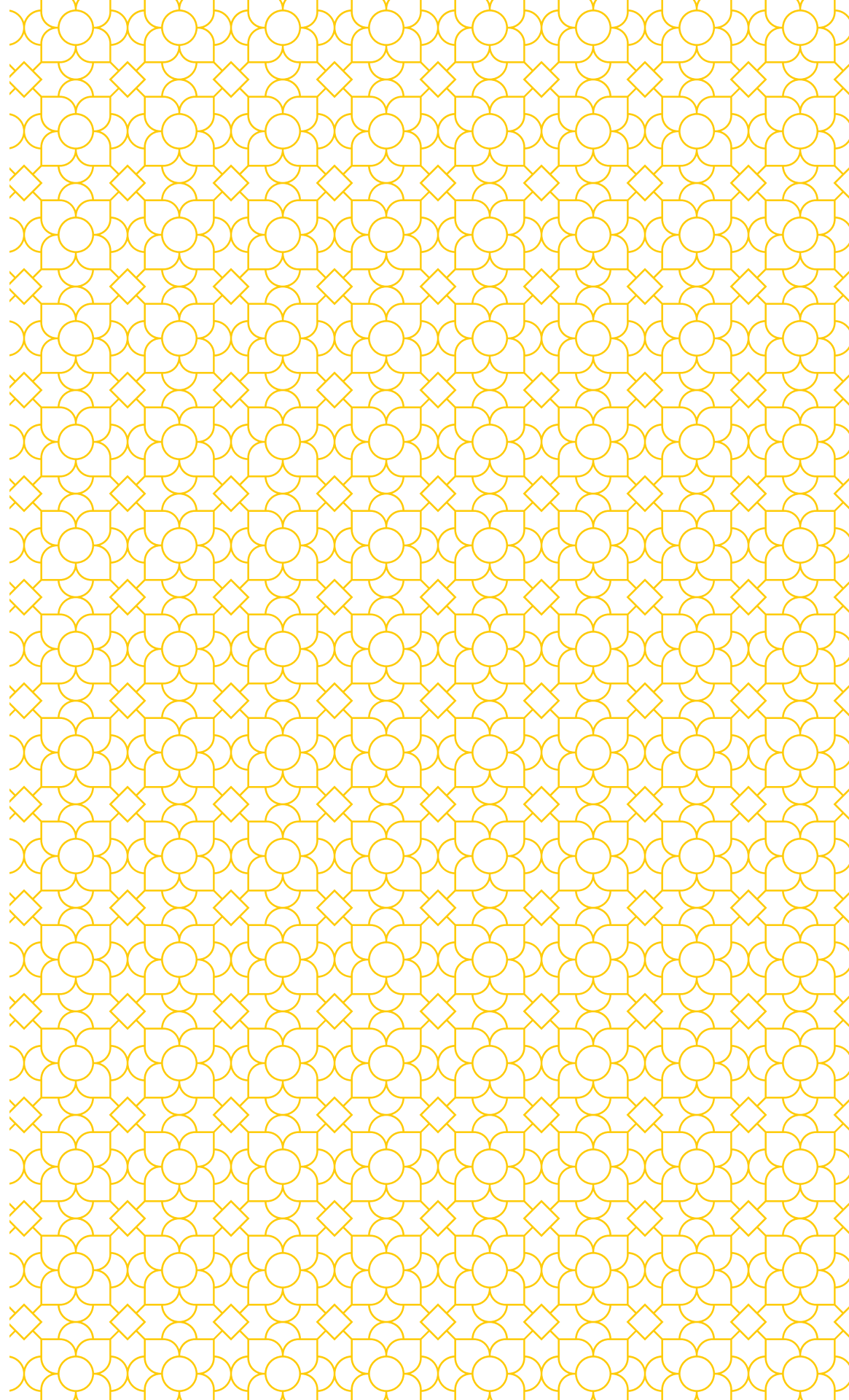
